In an ideal democracy, people should not vote in the name of caste, language or com-munity. The fever of "vote-catch-ing" had progressively reached the peak during the mid-term elec-tions, beginning from the 1952 general election, the Governor said. said.

said. Mr. Shah said that there was a vast gap developing between pa-rents and children. Parents had time for every thing else except for their children. Proper care could be bestowed on children only by educational institutions. He was happy to note that in this College personal contacts were es-tablished between students and professors and that the handicaps from which students suffered were being investigated.
