Stella Maris College has a custom developed Education Management Information System (EMIS) which is specifically designed to monitor the academic programmes and other educational support systems in order to enhance the student experience. The EMIS stores all student data from the time of admission into a programme to graduation. It stores personal data, exam and graduation records, hostel and library details, course registration, certificate course registration, and attendance records. Additionally, it stores records of the daytoday progress of students. This data is used to monitor student advancement, and assist course teachers and departments to

improve course syllabi and adopt appropriate teaching methodologies and assessment tools. The Examination focuses on: generation of Semester Examination timetables, examination seating arrangements, registration for Supplementary Examinations, Hall Ticket generation , mark entry, consolidation of End Semester results, Mark Sheet generation, registration for Convocation and consolidated Mark Sheet generation. module It also covers features such as category of examination (viva, practical, theoretical or combinations of both), Mark Sheet preparation, generation of Hall Ticket, GPA and CGPA reports, Mark Sheet printing, faculty grading and feedback, student evaluation and feedback. The Examination module SMS services have been integrated into the system. This allows bulk as well as selective SMS to be sent to parents and students. Bulk emails have also been enabled. The Fees Module is responsible for all fees processing information in the institution. This module enables the following processes: Generating Department Numbers and the fees challan for new students, semester fee payment, supplementary fee payment, generation of ID cards, Transfer Certificates and Course Registration. The Admissions Module enables online application for admissions, generating call letters, calling the applicant for interview, selection of applicant, sending SMS, email to selected applicants and generation of admission reports. Module is responsible for all Examination procedures in the institution. The Academic Module enables attendance posting for students, mentoring, request for student participation in extracurricular activities, and course registration.

Feedback Obtained
<p>Student feedback is an important mechanism and integral to institutional improvement and development. In SMC, student feedback is used to enhance the teaching-learning experience, to monitor and review quality and standards of educational endeavours, ensure the effectiveness of course design and delivery, to enable students to speak up, measure student satisfaction and to identify</p>

and encourage innovative practices. Different categories of surveys serve these purposes: Feedback is sought to assess the performance of an individual faculty member (Teacher Evaluation), a course of study (syllabus), at the end of every semester and at the point of exit for every degree programme. Types of mechanisms include the following: questionnaires, surveys, student representation on class feedback committees, reflection journals, overall institutional satisfaction at Student Council Meetings, other informal mechanisms. Analyses of feedback is taken through a centralised, online system, wherever possible. The questionnaires which use ordinal or Likert scales are summarised as frequencies and percentages and presented graphically. Some questionnaires and surveys contain open-ended questions which are systematically read by designated faculty. Common patterns and issues are identified in this manner. Open-ended questions provide an opportunity for students to make their voices heard and state their opinions without backlash. They are taken seriously, and where necessary, action is taken by the Principal. When the feedback is to improve the teaching-learning process, the analysis and representation is communicated to the faculty responsible to take action. The Principal takes up issues relating to faculty feedback every semester. The decision of the Principal on such action taken is final. Feedback from Student Council Meetings are discussed at the given forum, and responses given by the Principal. The issues are addressed directly, and recorded in the Minutes as decisions taken on a given issue which has been raised. These multiple feedback mechanisms ensures objectivity and encourages stakeholder participation in order to enhance student centered learning, continuous improvement in the teaching-learning process, innovative assessment practices and student support services.

Student mentoring is an integral part of the teaching-learning process in the institution Every faculty member is given a group of students to mentor for academic assistance and personal support. Care is taken to see that the mentor has taught, or has taught the students for some course, and the students are, therefore, not strangers to her. Among duties of the Mentor is to ensure that all details about the student are entered (the system is computerised), and the results of tests and examinations filled in within a stipulated time after the results have been declared. Comments and advice are also documented in the individual file of the student. Mentors and Mentees meet at least twice a semester, and whenever requested by Mentor/Mentee. Where needed, the Head of Department may be consulted. In cases where the issue requires the intervention of parents, a one-on-one meeting between Mentor, Mentee, and parent is held to resolve the issue. Mentoring is an important intervention for young people at-risk, particularly first-generation learners, students from disadvantaged and economically challenged sections of society, who find it difficult to transition to a higher educational system that is very different from their schools. The Mentor also takes on the role of guide who helps a young person in her personal growth. She provides support to vulnerable young women and establishes this service as a critical part of the Mentee's college experience. She also provides counselling services when needed, or directs her Mentee to a professional counsellor if the issue is serious and warrants professional intervention. Mentoring is thus a key to the development of academic and social skills for every student.

Maintenance and upkeep of the various facilities and infrastructure is overseen by the Campus Manager. The line of control flows from the Campus Manager to the Supervisor, down to the support staff. The Campus Manager allocates support staff for cleaning of classrooms and of the campus in general. The maintenance of laboratory equipment is overseen by the respective departments. Utilisation of the facilities is dependent on a system of planning the event/activity at the end of every academic year, and booking the facility manually through a register. The procedure will become online, shortly. Maintenance and updating of computers (hardware and software) is the job of the IT Department. Purchases are overseen by the internal auditor. All other purchases are overseen by the Supervisor. Science laboratories are maintained by the respective science departments. Stock taking of all the laboratories is conducted annually. The stock register is checked and signed by the Head of Department. A requisition letter requesting replacement/procuring of chemicals etc. is made to the Principal by the Head of Department and forwarded to the Bursar for release of funds. Bills in the original are first scrutinised by the internal auditor and then submitted to the Bursar. Departments keep a register of all procurements and replacements. An annual audit of the laboratories is undertaken by the state government agency. Procurement of equipment is done through a system of obtaining quotes from at least three vendors. The final decision is taken by the internal auditor after scrutiny of the various provisions of the quotation, focusing on quality and cost. Departments also maintain an Issue Register, Accessory Register (separately for chemicals and apparatus) and a Condemned Register. Annual maintenance of all campus infrastructure and facilities is undertaken by the Campus Manager and assisted by the Supervisor. The Department of Physical Education has oversight and organisational control over games and sports activities in the institution. All logistics are determined by the Physical Directress, who also takes feedback from athletes and other team players and individual sports persons about the arrangements for travel, hospitality and arrangements at the location of various competitions. The Sports and Games Budget is decided by the Bursar, and the logistical and expenses are planned by the Physical Directress, in keeping with available funds. Strict criteria is adhered to when coaches for sports and games are recruited. Applications are scrutinised at the primary level by the Directress, and approved by the Principal

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The Student Council (The Stella Maris College Students' Union) of the College plays a supportive and participative role in the activities of the institution, and is a "cooperative forum" which ensures a highly democratic and participatory role in furthering the goals, objectives and mission and vision of the institution. The Union is responsible for the conduct of various student-centered extra-curricular activities on campus such as inter-year, inter-collegiate cultural competitions, Club Day performances, and other cultural programmes in consultation with the Deans of Student Affairs. The Union Office Bearers comprise six members: The President, the Vice-President, Treasurer, General Secretary and two Cultural Secretaries from the two shifts. Their roles and functions are contained the Stella Maris College Students' Constitution. They are elected through self-nomination for any one post. The nominations are scrutinised by the Election Commission comprising the Principal, Vice-Principals and the Deans of Student Affairs. In true democratic style, they are permitted to campaign for a fixed number of days, followed by the e-polling process, the dates for which are drawn up by the Deans. The key members of the Students' Union are involved in the activities of the IQAC. They support the IQAC in the student feedback process, provide it with data pertaining to quality improvement initiatives in the functioning of the Union activities, as well as the actions and policy decisions adopted by the institution and various departments for improving the quality of education. There are Students' Union representatives in the IQAC, as well as student representatives from every department of the College. They undergo training and receive input on their role and functions, and are active participants in the functioning of the IQAC. Student representatives are part of the Boards of Studies of every department. They play a significant role in decision making by providing references and feedback on curriculum, teaching and assessment. Student Class Committees provide direct feedback to the Deans of Academic affairs on quality, relevance and suitability of syllabi for careers, outcomes of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and suggestions for improvement. They meet with the Deans mid-way through every semester, so that effective remedial action may be taken wherever required. Student Council Meetings held at the end of every semester comprises members of the Students' Union and Class Representatives of every class in the College. These meetings are a forum for major feedback sessions on the infrastructure, facilities and other aspects of the College's functioning. The meetings are held in the presence of the Principal, Vice-Principals, Deans and faculty members of the College. Wherever possible, the Council Members are encouraged to initiate improvements in the functioning and services of various units of the College such as the Bank operations on campus, the canteen, and the bus services through the proper channel, before the meeting and present the responses and results. The feedback from the student body on the Students' Union activities is also presented at these meetings, and suggestions for improvement decided upon.

The institution has put in place management strategies where faculty members holding administrative positions, key administrative officers and other faculty members are actively involved in decision-making processes, thereby utilising the full potential of the intellectual and emotional human capital available in the College. 1. The Staff Council is the highest decision-making body in the institution. It comprises the Principal as the Chairperson, the Secretary, the Vice-President of the FMM, the Vice-Principals, the Deans, Directors, Heads of Departments, the IQAC Coordinator, the Controller of Examinations, Associate Controller of Examinations, the Librarian, the Physical Directress, the NSS Coordinator, NCC Officer, the Office Superintendent, Bursar, and the Campus Maintenance Manager. Major decisions pertaining to student affairs, academics, examinations, planning and implementation are brought to the Staff Council, which debates on the issue at hand, and by voice vote, takes a decision on the matter. In case of lack of consensus, the Principal has the final say. The decisions are incorporated into the minutes of the meeting, which are signed by the Principal and Vice-Principals. The finalised minutes, containing the decisions taken are kept in the Office of the Vice-Principals to be read by the

general faculty body. Decisions involving changes in policy/regulations are incorporated into the academic handbook for the new academic year. 2.The Departmental Quality Assurance Cell (DQAC) is an offshoot of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College. As a facilitative and participative organ of the institution, the DQAC is the driving force for ushering in quality at the department level by working out intervention strategies to "remove deficiencies and enhance quality." Structure: The HoD of the Department heads the Cell. The other members hold the post for a period of three years, on rotation. Composition: The DQAC comprises the HoD and one senior faculty member of the department (if it is not the HoD) in an undergraduate-only department, and the HoD, and two/three senior members of a department offering both undergraduate and postgraduate programmes. An external expert on quality management is also be a part of the DQAC. Functions:

- Development and application of quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the Department.
- Facilitating the creation of a learner-centric environment conducive for quality education
- Arrangement for feedback responses from students, parents and other stakeholders

- Dr. Bernadine Joseph suggested that the Department of Commerce prepare a separate set of questions. The group suggested that all departments follow the same pattern.
- It was decided that inclusive teaching methods be integrated in course work. Dr. Leema Francis and Dr. Vidya Srinivasan pointed out that all faculty members may not be able to integrate such methodologies.
- The external will be the lead team member. Members suggested having two to three questions under each category for the student questionnaire. Dr. Rajini suggested reordering of the questionnaire with reference to quantitative learning and the questionnaire was reordered.

- Faculty members agreed to all points under the other thematic areas and finalised the student's questionnaire with a few more inclusions.
- The schedule for the site visit of the academic audit was finalised to be held from 16 to 21 August, 2018.
- Dr. Bernadine Joseph suggested that the guidelines for Academic Audit of our College be formatted in the pdf form and then circulated to the external members.

Dr. Shiny John Vairamon welcomed the gathering and shared with the faculty members the 'Quality Mandate' sent by the UGC for Higher Educational Institutions

Dr. Bernadine Joseph briefed the members on the purpose of conducting the academic audit and the expected outcome of academic audit. The following are the points shared by her.

- The objective of academic audit is to evaluate the process rather than the product. Academic Audit is not for any accreditation or grading, but to improve the quality processes so that we can effectively work towards quality education.
- There are different mandates to be followed to run an institution. She also shared a newspaper clipping published on July 30, 2018 which appreciates the outcome based education.

She also briefed the members on the need of Academic Audit? and pointed out the following as the main reasons for conducting such an audit:

- To review and evaluate the courses and programmes to ascertain quality processes and procedures
- To develop action plans that ensure enhancement
- To ensure excellence in quality of education
- To identify and share good practices involving social commitment, holistic education, inclusiveness, good classroom activities and she emphasised on the need of collaborative work

- Coordinator of B.Voc. requested a clarification on how to assess the learning outcome for the B.Voc. Programme as the first batch is doing their final year. Dr. Bernadine added that more emphasis on structured and recorded/ documented feedback from all the stakeholders should be given. All feedback should be measurable. Anything by word of mouth will not be valid until it is documented.
- It was repeatedly emphasised in the meeting that Academic Audit is more on self-reflection and self-improvement.
- Dr. Bernadine also spoke on the AA process which includes peer review and is faculty driven and aims towards students' success.
- AAA can be done externally / internally. Syllabus revision should be done after getting the feedback from all stakeholders, structured conversations and evaluations.
- AA will include Self Study, SSR, Auditor site visit followed by ongoing improvement initiatives.
- The quality of AA can be maintained only if all stakeholders are involved and outcome based assessment is followed. A proper method /structure to be followed and conversations to be organised by focal area.
- Terminologies such as outcome, objective were discussed. The outcome should be based on the level of the course (introductory/advanced)
- Details on what all NAAC expects to upload in the website were explained. Dr. Bernadine also added that papers published in scopus indexed or WoS only will be considered by NAAC.
- Curricula should be revised based on the feedback, relevance to society, environment, etc.
- The format followed for academic audit in the institution is TRB 16-17 which is being followed by many universities in US, Africa and few Indian Institutions. Audit team will meet the faculty and students separately. Once the audit team submits the report, it will be sent to the departments and the departments have full right to respond or comment on the report.

### **Academic Audit Team**

- A faculty team of 20 members underwent training on the basics of audit principles and those members will visit the departments in teams along with external member. The Audit team will look into how the SSR and the evidence matches, the improvements and performance and report on the improvements required. The auditor team will give commendations, affirmations and recommendations at their exit meet. The Departments are allotted dates for the audit team to visit and the team will visit the faculty in Shift I Department from 2- 4 pm and shift II from 9.30- 11.30 am during the allotted dates. They will visit the students of shift I from 12-1 and Shift II from 1-2 pm.

- The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the technical difficulties that exist in the existing IQAC template software. The existing system is not user friendly and requires too much effort to acquire and retrieve data.
- Dr. Shiny proposed that a new Common Framework can be designed to cater to the needs of different reports required for AQAR, AAPR, NIRF, NAAC, etc.
- She also pointed out that as a first step we have to begin identifying the requirements of how to store data, so that collating it for various purposes must be simplified, thereby requiring less effort.
- Ms. Priya discussed deriving/ extracting data from existing sources. Dr. Shiny also said that data from different sources were not tallying (for example, data from the administrative office data and IT Department were not tallying). Therefore data needs to be maintained on periodical basis.
- Dr. Shiny discussed the possibility of calling on the Departments to collect students' data. But Ms. Jeyapriya suggested that student data must be collected during application form entry for admission procedure. This would help us collect data at one point and it would be valid.
- Ms. Chanchu said that she had faced problems whenever a sum to total data was needed since the data did not tallying. For instance, when faculty retired or left, details were not accurately available.
- Various committees decide on how data must be derived and analysed. They require data of different base periods. Also classification of data (special categories, community wise, religion wise, minority data) is a problem.
- The team decided to first study what data is required about students and acquire it during application entry for admission to various programmes of study.

- It was decided to understand the 7 parameters that NAAC requires.

So the team decided to read this. It was divided among the members as follows:

1. Ms. Jeyapriya – Curriculum aspects, Infrastructure learning resources.
2. Dr. Shiny, Ms. Suganya, Ms. Arwa – Teaching learning and Evaluation, Student support and progress
3. Ms. Priya – Research Innovation and extension, Institutional values and best practices
4. Ms. Birunda – Governance leadership and management

The meeting began at 3.30 pm with a prayer by Sr. Susan Matheikal.

**Proceedings:**

Dr. Shiny John Vairamon, IQAC Co-ordinator welcomed the members of the Advisory Board and introduced the external member Dr. Fathima Vasanth, Deputy Principal, Loyola College. The other external members Mr. V. Suresh, Ms. Latha Pandiarajan and Ms. Rajyashree had expressed their regret in being unable to join.

The minutes of the previous meeting were perused and passed. Dr. Vairamon made a general presentation on the role of the IQAC and highlighted the various reports that have been submitted during this academic year. The highlights of her presentation included the facts that NAAC Accreditation has been extended for seven years up to February 20, 2021. The College has been granted extension of Autonomy up to 2023. The College participated in the NIRF for the first time last year and has been ranked 30<sup>th</sup> out of 1495 Colleges (2018) in India.

Dr. Vairamon then gave an overview of all the faculty enrichment sessions that were conducted during the academic year. She also mentioned that sessions were conducted for IQAC student representatives and administrative staff. A workshop was conducted for the Support staff on wellness. Since February regular meetings have been held by the IQAC Steering Committee to study the new NAAC format.

During the academic year several colleges from across the country have visited the college to study the innovations and best practices of the College, namely Auxilium College, Assam and B.V.Raju College, Bhimavaram, A.P. The Mar Gregorious College of Arts & Science, Chennai Attended an orientation on Academic Audit at Stella Maris

The suggestions of the previous advisory committee meeting have been implemented this academic year and this was highlighted.

The research paper publications and presentations of the faculty were highlighted. The details of Faculty who have registered as Ph.D guides was presented. Several students have also been awarded fellowships at leading research institutes. The details of the various MoU's signed with foreign universities and Faculty and Student Exchange programmes were highlighted. Six International Conferences were organised this academic year and also several National Conferences and Workshops.

Based on last year's recommendation at the advisory board meeting, a session on Professional Ethics was organised and the resource person was Dr. V. Suresh, General Secretary, PUCL

The college also participated in NIRF and was ranked 30<sup>th</sup> in the rankings.

The floor was then opened for discussion.

Dr. Fathima Vasanth suggested that the plan of action report should be presented immediately after the perusal of the minutes of the previous meeting so that the steps taken to implement become clearer. She congratulated the IQAC coordinator for implementing most of the suggestions of the previous meeting. She said that the suggestions had been taken seriously and sincere effort had been made to implement maximum suggestions.

This was followed by a discussion on the NIRF ranking system which has become cumbersome and tedious to work on. Dr. Vasanth enquired as to how the college was dealing with it. Dr. Rosy Joseph said that the students of the Computer Science Department had developed a template and department faculty were updating information at regular intervals so the process has been smoothed out to an extent. Dr. Vairamon said several rounds of meeting of the steering

committee have been held to create a framework on dealing with the 7 parameters and developing quantitative and qualitative matrices, however the biggest challenge still remained collection of data.

There was a discussion on promotion and enhancement of the research culture on campus. Dr. Renuka Rajrathnam shared details of student involvement in research. She spoke of the time constraints faced by the faculty in doing research in a largely teaching oriented environment. Dr. Rosy Joseph spoke of how research scholars on campus have now been roped into teaching to facilitate more time for faculty doing research.

Dr. Vasanth shared the Loyola experience on promoting research. She said the institution had an exclusive centre to facilitate research and cash awards have proved to be a big incentive to promote research. Every department is asked to present research proposals which are judged and selected by an external board. The best proposals are selected and funded. The best work is awarded. This has created a healthy competition among departments to get their proposals selected and awarded.

Research proposals submitted by students get about Rs. 50,000/- as funding. For faculty 75% of the research cost is funded. Faculty are also given a citation which is presented to them at the Annual Research Award Function. These initiatives have greatly enhanced the research atmosphere in Loyola. Funds for research have been raised through industrial funding, alumni support and from the management.

To Dr. Sumitra Dawson's enquiry if Loyola has a central funding committee, the answer was in the negative, Dr. Vasanth said Loyola has a very strong alumni support. Suggestion was made by Dr. Rajrathnam that the college should identify corporates, whose CSR is towards promotion of women's education. She also said our MoU's with foreign universities should explore possibilities for promoting global research. Dr. Sandra Joseph said the Bank of New York, has partnered with the college in setting up a life skills centre which will be coming up shortly.

Dr. Mary N. L. suggested a brainstorming session with leading CEO's to discuss the possibility of research funding. Dr. Agnes Rozario suggested fund raising programmes to be spread across the semester to raise seed money for research. There was a suggestion that several companies would be happy to train students to be industry ready while they are in college itself, so this can be capitalized on to get financial support. There was a suggestion that all the students who get employed via the CGC should contribute their first month salary to the college.

Dr. Vasanth said that each department should be asked to submit at least 5 research proposals.

Dr. Vairamon enquired how Loyola was able to collect data on alumni employment and higher studies since this is required for NIRF ranking. Dr. Vasanth shared that on the day of Convocation the graduates are asked to report in the morning and all the relevant information is gathered, only after that are they given the token and gown to participate in the convocation.

Dr. Bernadine Joseph was of the opinion that all the discussions at the IQAC advisory meeting should be made known to the faculty and their feedback should be sought. Dr. Vairamon requested that all the members of the advisory board should co-operate in the spread of information to the faculty as it is very difficult for the IQAC coordinator to single handedly get feedback from faculty. The term of office of the present external members is coming to an end and suggestions are sought for new members.

The meeting concluded at 5 pm, Dr. Sr. Rosy Joseph, Principal and Sr. Susan, Secretary thanked Dr. Fathima Vasanth for her invaluable suggestions and also thanked the participating members. A special word of appreciation was accorded to Dr. Shiny Vairamon for all the efforts taken in steering the IQAC and organizing the meeting.

### ***ACTION TAKEN REPORT FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE INTERNAL ACADEMIC AUDIT***

Academic Audit was held between 03 September 2018 and 14 September 2018. Academic Audit was conducted for all departments. with a team of External and Internal Academicians. The process helped to assess and evaluate the functioning of Departments and their respective programmes on quality parameters and create matrices of improvement. 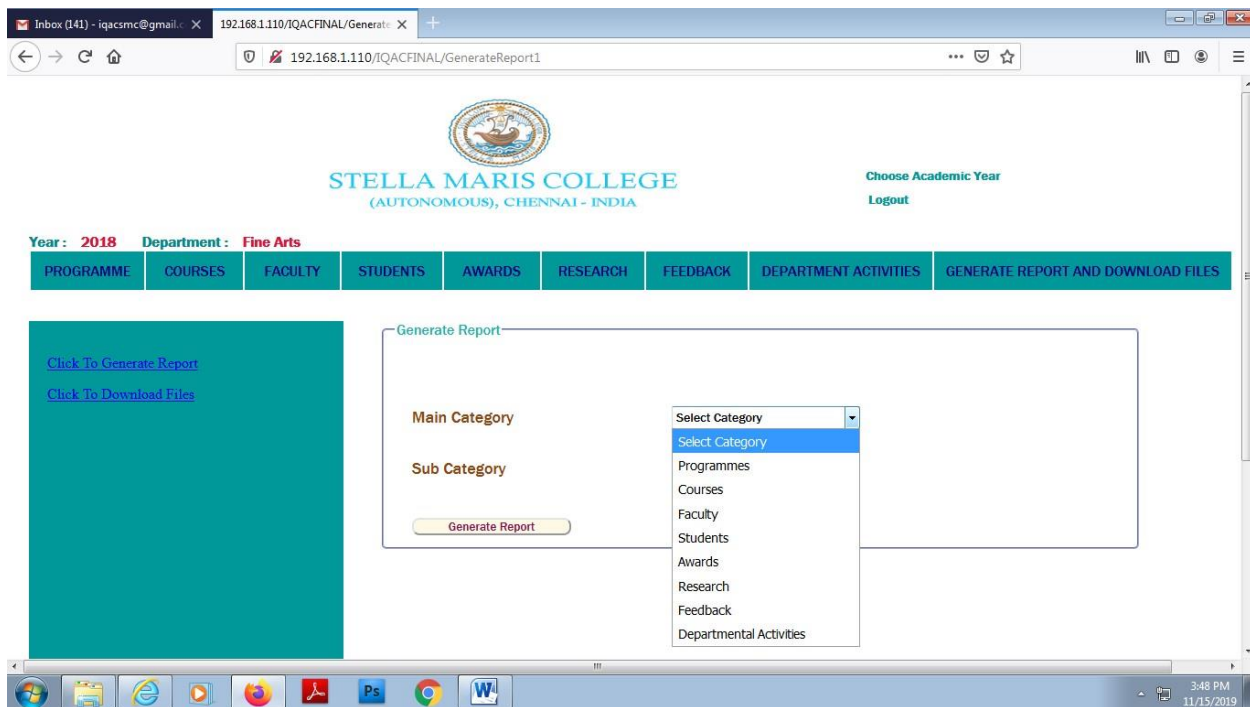

- Introduction of Interdisciplinary courses to provide an interdisciplinary approach to the programmes
- Holistic development through Life Skills Courses: An awareness of societal issues, citizenship rights, culture, health and hygiene and holistic way of life through soft skills courses
- Credit transfer of online courses into regular elective course options
- Introduction of extra credit options through certificate courses for postgraduate students, through Student Training Programmes (Games, NSS, YRC & NCC) under Part V for undergraduate students
- Introduction of Service Learning as a pedagogy for enhanced learning outcomes and a deeper and more meaningful community engagement
- Two streams in Foundation English: (i) skills approach (ii) language through literature
