ABOUT THE COLLEGE

Stella Maris College, a Catholic minority institution of higher education for women is an autonomous institution affiliated to the University of Madras and is partly residential. It is managed by the Society of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary, a Catholic religious congregation founded in 1877 by Hélène de Chappotin, today revered as Blessed Mary of the Passion. Guided by her charism, the initiatives of the College arise from a sound philosophy of life based on faith in God and the contemporary reality of a pluralistic Indian society that is challenged by global ideologies and cultures.

The College was founded on 15 August 1947 in a small one-storeyed building with 32 students in Santhome, in the city of Chennai. In 1960, it moved to its present campus "The Cloisters" on Cathedral Road. Today, the College has an enrollment of more than 6000 students from diverse backgrounds, communities and nations.

The College is committed to serving the economically and socially marginalised sections of society. It provides university education in a Christian atmosphere for deserving students, especially those belonging to the Catholic community. Admission is open to all, irrespective of caste and creed and their rights of conscience are respected.

The College is affiliated to the University of Madras and became autonomous in 1987. It currently offers 25 undergraduate, 15 postgraduate programmes, seven research programmes and a PG Diploma in Computer Science. and two certificate programmes in International Business and Data Science. Collaborative international programmes include a stand-alone Postgraduate Certificate in International Business leading to a one-year International Master's in Business Administration (IMBA), a one-year Stella Maris College

Diploma in Data Science, leading to a one-year MSc in Science from at Liverpool University, UK, and a Graduate Express Gateway Certificate in Leadership leading to a two-year Masters in Leadership from Trinity Western University, Canada.

As an Autonomous institution, the College frames its own courses of study and adopts innovative methods of teaching, learning and evaluation. In keeping with its tradition of promoting innovation and growth, the College introduced the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for the undergraduate programmes from the academic year 1997–98. The CBCS was introduced for all postgraduate programmes from the academic year 2000–2001. With the introduction of the CBCS, new academic programmes, including interdisciplinary programmes and courses, were offered. The goals of the CBCS are as follows:

- to provide a broad-based, liberal education for all students
- to enable students to choose courses at basic/advanced levels
- to enable students to progress at their own pace
- to enable highly motivated students to go beyond minimum requirements and earn extra credits

Truth and Charity is the motto of the College. The College strives to encourage young women to continually search for truth, and grow into mature and responsible women, ready to face the challenges of life at home and in society. The ceaseless quest for truth and the untiring spirit of selfless service is the hallmark of a true Stella Marian.

The College emblem represents a ship sailing on stormy waters led by a star. This symbolises the student's life, guided amidst tempests by the light of Stella Maris, Mother Mary, the Star of the Sea.

Blue and Gold are the colours of the Stella Maris standard. Blue symbolises truth, loyalty and fidelity and gold symbolises love, zeal and charity.

 the fees with a penalty. Absence from College, whether with
 leave or without leave, forms no ground for exemption from the
 enforcement of the rule.

- Students who fail to pay the whole amount due from them before the commencement of the semester will have their names deleted from the rolls.
- Holders of scholarships are bound by all the above regulations.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND FACILITIES

The College prides itself on the well-developed infrastructure and facilities on its campus, all of which support the mission of the College to create an atmosphere conducive to the teaching-learning process, research, and student welfare. Our goal is to ensure that students have access to all resources that will enable them to succeed in their pursuit of educational excellence and become responsible citizens.

THE LIBRARY

The Stella Maris College Library is fully automated with a wide collection of the latest books, periodicals and CDs. There are 117221 books, 8559 journals (print and online) accessible to all members of the College community. The library subscribes to several magazines and 12 newspapers. The Open Access System provides reading and reference facilities for faculty and students.

All the operations and services of the library have been automated with RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology. This is one of the latest technologies used in library theft detection systems and also eases circulation services and inventory control. Electronic databases like EBSCO, N-List, Indiastat.com, Sage online journals and American Economic Review journals are made available to the members of the library via the internet and the College's intranet. The Library also hosts DSpace, a digital repository which provides access to syllabi, academic papers presented at national and international fora, question papers, course schedules, synopses of theses and other research-related documents with full text wherever possible.

The Library has subscribed to the plagiarism software TURNITIN which helps to detect plagiarism in a document and also generates a report showing the similarities. Wi-Fi Facility is available in the Library. Reprographic services like photocopying, printing and scanning are made available to all members of the College Community.

Every student is required to attend an orientation programme "Know Your Library" immediately after enrolment.

Lending Services

- Every undergraduate student may borrow two library books and every postgraduate student may borrow five library books at a time for a period of one week.
- Books that have been reserved by other members of the library are issued for two days only.
- · Books can be issued either at the counter or by using the RFID self-

kiosk.

 Books can be returned at the return counter or through the drop box kept outside the Library adjacent to the OAT.

Identity Cards

- Students must scan their Identity card (ID) before entering the library.
- Exchange of ID cards is not permitted.
- Students must immediately report the loss of their ID card to the Librarian.

Rules And Regulations

- · Strict silence should be maintained in the library.
- Books will be issued or renewed only if the student produces/ her identity card.
- Students are not allowed to bring any printed matter or files into the library.
- Students must deposit their mobile phones and wallets at the token counter and obtain a token to ensure return of the articles.
- Books must not be marked or damaged in any manner.
- Students must examine each book before borrowing and immediately report any damaged/missing pages to the Librarian.
- Students shall replace or pay for the cost of any book lost or damaged by them. If one book of a set is lost or damaged the whole set shall be replaced.
- A fine of Rs.2/- is charged for each day a book is overdue for the first week, and thereafter Rs.3/- for each day it is overdue.
- The student must return all books and settle any outstanding dues prior to applying for the Transfer Certificate.

ARCHIVES

Stellarchives, the College archives, is housed inside the Stella Maris College Library. Stellarchives serves the College community by preserving institutional records, artefacts, and manuscripts. The archival collections document the history of the institution from its founding in 1947 to the present day.

Stellarchives houses a few rare, old books, autographed books written by the faculty, students and visitors to the College, doctoral theses of students and faculty members; photographs and ephemera such as invitations, programme sheets printed for various occasions; magazines and departmental journals printed and published over the years, and records of the different projects carried out by the various departments in the College.

The archives include a collection of posters and brochures of all College events, the history of the College Logo and the College Song, blueprints of all College buildings with their history. It also houses an extensive collection of artefacts such as the College seal, logo, printing blocks, banners, and flags as well as the College Visitors' Books. There is also a unique collection of about 600 coins from six continents.

The holdings are accessible to all in digitised form. The preserved originals are available only for restricted viewing.

CENTRES FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AND CAPACITY BUILDING

The College has developed core facilities that bring together existing expertise and resources into focused Centres that seek to develop abilities, explore issues, encourage and sustain research, introduce new ideas, skills, enable technological advancements and offer training to empower and prepare students for higher levels of academic attainment.

DST-FIST Laboratories

The earliest of such Centres is the state-of-the-art laboratory instituted by the Department of Mathematics in 2006 with financial assistance from the Fund for Improvement of Science & Technology Infrastructure (FIST) of the Department of Science & Technology (DST), Government of India, with the aim of introducing a scientific computing environment based on mathematical approaches to cater to the needs of teaching, learning, research and industrial applications. Funds were also sanctioned for purchase of books to support and enhance research activities.

In 2015, the DST also sanctioned financial assistance under the DST–FIST Programme—2015 Level '0' to purchase high-end equipment, software and books to strengthen teaching and research facilities in science departments of the College. Funds were also sanctioned for purchase of books to support and enhance research activities. Equipment which includes Solid UV–Vis Spectrophotometer, ATR–FTIR Spectrophotometer, HPLC, Gel-Doc Molecular Imager, Orbital Shaker, Probe Sonicator, Electrochemical Workstation and two software—Schrodinger and MATLAB—have been obtained with the sanctioned grant.

The Centre for Research in Science and Technology

The Centre for Research in Science and Technology (CRIST) was set up in 2010 with the objective of promoting research in the fields of Chemistry, Biotechnology and Microbiology. Set up with basic instruments, today, the Centre has preeminent facilities with state-of-the-art equipment and instruments and is a prime resource Centre for research for faculty, research scholars and students.

A three-month Certificate Course on Exploring Nanoscience— Synthesis and Characterization of Nanoparticles in collaboration with the DST unit of Nanoscience and Thematic Unit of Excellence, IIT-Madras, is offered to undergraduate students of the departments of Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology under the auspices of CRIST. A series of lectures from eminent personalities in the field of science and technology is arranged periodically. The sophisticated instrumentation facility is outsourced to students from other colleges, universities and research institutions.

Stella Maris Research and International Partnerships Centre

The Stella Maris Research and International Partnerships Centre (SMRIPC) was first conceived in 2013 as the Stella Maris International Centre for Multidisciplinary Research, (SMICMR) instituted with the purpose of striving for enhancing research in the College and bringing together like-minded researchers and scholars to leverage the existing skills and expertise for excellence and innovation in research

Building on the existing research strength and recognizing the need to merge local academic interests with the global and address a much-needed initiative of internationalisation of research, the SMRIPC was re-conceptualised into the Stella Maris Research and International Partnerships Centre. The Centre focuses encouraging and creating avenues for international research partnerships and exchange programmes to enable the College community to explore and take advantage of global educational developments. The Research Centre provides information and services in support of research activities carried out within the College. The main objective of the Centre is to assist the College community in gaining and managing research collaborations and partnerships, shared research activities, grants and international contracts. The Centre supports the integration of a research ambience within the institutional academic climate, positioning research as an integral aspect of educational endeavours, right from the undergraduate to the PhD level.

In collaboration with SKILLSCAPE, an incubated cell of IIT Madras Research Park, the SMRIPC has opened opportunities for students and faculty to take up courses in Academic Writing and Research Projects writing. The Academic Writing will be enhanced with upscaled tools and methods with an emphasis on areas in content development, journal writing, research and proposal writing assistance.

The Centre is supported by a dedicated team of the Research Council Advisory Board and the SMC Ethics committee.

Centre for Women's Studies

The Centre for Women's Studies (CWS) was instituted on 12 December 2009 and was sanctioned by the UGC under the XI Plan in the academic year 2009- 2010.

The vision of the Centre is to sensitise, educate, and empower students to work towards the creation of a just and egalitarian society that upholds the dignity and equality of women in India.

The Centre aims to

- create awareness regarding disparities and challenges faced by women
- provide an insight into the gender construct and its various dimensions
- be instrumental in bringing about a paradigm shift in the socialisation of women's issues through a systematic programme of teaching, research, action and appropriate interventions
- create an understanding of women-related issues and empower young women to become agents of social change

Incubation Centre

The Incubation Centre promotes technological, and knowledge based innovative ventures among students and faculty. It facilitates

collaborative networks through partnerships between academia, industry, government and financial Institutions. The aim is to encourage and assist students to emerge as financially independent women by training and enabling them to set up profitable ventures.

The following are the objectives of the Centre.

- To catalyse the transformation of students from job seekers to job providers
- To build a vibrant start-up ecosystem by providing cost-effective, value-added services
- To support entrepreneurial activities in the initial stages so that they can eventually grow into profitable ventures
- To provide a platform for commercialisation of technologies

Any member of the academic community of the College may avail of the various facilities available at the Centre, by applying for it along with relevant documents indicated in the form.

Informatics Centre

The Informatics Centre aims to provide Information Technology Services and e-Governance solutions to the institution. The following are the objectives of the Centre:

- To support the teaching and learning process by harnessing Information Technology tools and services
- To promote research by providing state-of-the-art computing, networking, software and storage technologies
- To create the right technology platform to promote e-Governance and m-Governance
- To enhance information security, privacy and accessibility to all the users
- To facilitate documentation and instant report generation

SMCDRIVE

Stella Maris Centre for Development of Resources for Inclusion and Vocational Enrichment (SMCDRIVE), the Extension Centre of the College, has its roots in the Social Welfare Centre Shanthi Bhavan started by Sr. Thecla Camacho fmm, in 1954. In keeping with the changing needs of society SMCDRIVE aims at fostering an inclusive and just society.

SMCDRIVE Skills Development Centre in collaboration with Bank of New York Mellon and International Association for Human Values offers certificate courses in

- Employability skills (Digital literacy-Excel, Tally, Soft Skills and English Communication) necessary for development, employment, entrepreneurship and sustainability.
- · Livelihood skills through beautician and tailoring courses
- Special Certificate courses in Sign Language and Lay Counselling

All these certificate courses are offered free of cost for both Stella Maris students and marginalised sections of society. Job fairs are conducted to support in placements.

Stella Maris College Extension Project Centre

The Stella Maris College Extension Project Centre (SMCEPC) at Tirupachur village was dedicated to the local community with the construction of a new facility in 2013. Situated on thirteen acres of village land, this rural Centre provides urban school and college youth a place to reflect and equip themselves to serve the rural community. Students of the College can also translate the learning from the classrooms and labs into practice in the community.

A Common Service Centre (CSC) has been set up offering fourteen Business to Consumer, nine Government to Citizen and five Skill Development Services. Computer training is given to Anganwadi workers under the National Digital Literacy Mission (NDLM) and is available to all in the village.

Stella Maris Centre for Human Resource Development

The Stella Maris Centre for Human Resource Development (SMCHRD) seeks to enhance innovative and collaborative high-quality education and promote institutional development. Enhancing and sustaining quality in education, fostering a sense of belonging to the institution and strengthening the culture of excellence is the prime objective of the Centre. The Centre functions as the focal point of institutionalising and channelising the activities of the various Centres of the College.

It will facilitate effective organisation of training programmes for the professional and personal development of faculty and students. Its activities will also be geared towards skill development training, exploring/undertaking projects, networking and collaborating with different organisations, effective implementation of the eco-initiatives of the College and the improved use of sustainable energy for environmental upkeep and ecological balance.

Jayshree Venkatraman Digital Learning and Research Centre

The Jayshree Venkatraman Digital Learning and Research Centre (JVDLRC) was inaugurated on 31 August 2021 in memory of

Ms. Jayshree Venkatraman, an alumnus of Stella Maris College.

The Digital Centre, installed with cutting-edge equipment alongside sophisticated audio-visual technology, aims to leverage the students' potential in learning and research with the aid of digital technology.

Computer Centre

The Computer Centre of Stella Maris College has state-of-the-art facilities with networks of around 715 nodes. Besides having two well-equipped computer laboratories attached to the Department of Computer Science, the College has other well-equipped computer laboratories which are used for courses in Computer Science, computational and IT needs of students as well as for internet browsing.

Application Development Innovation Engine

The Application Development Innovation Engine (ADIE) was set up with a vision to encourage students explore and develop applications that are closer to operating system. It aims to create a student community with enhanced programming skills and apply industry standard practices.

The lab has been setup and maintained by the ADIE members. This exposure will enrich their knowledge in all dimensions and offers an extra lead in taking up open-source community projects.

Stella Maris Industry Connect

The Stella Maris Industry Connect was initiated to enhance the relevance and quality of higher education by bridging the gap between academia and industry for the holistic development of students. It will serve as a vital link between SMC and industries foster collaborations, facilitate internships, support innovation, and organise industry events and workshops.

St Francis of Assisi Centre for Peace Studies

The St Francis of Assisi Centre for Peace Studies, inaugurated on 19 July 2023, is the nodal point for all activities related to Peace Education in Stella Maris College. Set up as part of the Project titled Youth for Peace: Enhancing Knowledge, Attitude, Skills and Behaviour for Peacebuilding and Conflict Transformation funded by the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia, the Centre, housed in Room F 1-7, coordinates all peace related training programmes, talks and workshops for faculty and students. It also functions as a resource centre for scholars who wish to work on Peace Studies

Stella Maris Think Tank

The Stella Maris College Think Tank focuses its work along specific themes in keeping with the mission and vision of the College and in alignment with the interests and expertise of the various members who belong to different concentrations of study. The members include students and faculty members.

The members work policy analysis at the local level to provide evidence based solutions for societal change, addressing issues of social justice and equity, studying the impact of AI and other emerging technologies on education and society in terms of ethical implications, researching intersections of culture, race and identity and the impact of globalisation on indigenous societies, and probing possibilities and modes of conflict resolution and peaceful negotiations beginning with campus societies and moving on to local and regional communities for the establishment of peace initiatives.

STUDENT SERVICES

The Office of the Deans of Student Affairs

The Office of the Deans of Student Affairs comprises a team of faculty

members who are advisors to the Students' Union. Their responsibility is to promote student welfare at all levels. The office offers the following services:

- · Guidance and assistance in the co-ordination of student activities
- Counselling
- · Information on the availability of student scholarships
- · Arrangements for bus passes for students
- Distribution of food tokens for the students in need
- Conducts Students' Union elections

The Students' Union

The Students' Union, comprising representatives elected via secret ballot from both shifts, offers a range of services to fellow students. They act as the official representatives of the student body within the institution. The office bearers of the Students' Union comprise the President, Vice President, two Treasurers, General Secretary, and two Cultural Secretaries. They are elected annually by the students through a confidential online ballot conducted at the end of each academic year for the subsequent term.

The Students' Union conducts elections for Class Representatives for their respective classes at the beginning of the academic year. Together with the Students' Union members, they constitute the Student Council. The Students Union also oversees the election of office bearers for the various clubs on campus and co-ordinate the activities of these clubs.

The aims of the Students' Union are:

- To uphold and work for the attainment of the vision and mission of the College by organising suitable programmes and events in consultation with Deans of Student Affairs and with the prior sanction of the Principal promote healthy and responsible participation in extracurricular activities.
- To take feedback regarding general facilities on campus from the

student body under the guidance and supervision of the Deans of Student Affairs and resolve issues wherever possible.

Mentoring

The College has a well-established mentoring programme for students, focusing on the mentee's academic advancement, career development, and personal development.

The mentoring objectives for students are:

- To help mentees clarify their academic goals and develop study skills
- To enable them to overcome the diverse challenges of campus life
- To help them navigate and explore career options, internships and job opportunities
- To help them develop confidence and motivation to achieve their full potential
- To guide them in their quest for selfhood
- To support leadership development and resilience
- To facilitate the creation of avenues for networking and collaboration with peers, faculty, and alumnae for guidance and support
- To foster in mentees a strong sense of community within the campus, an understanding of unity in difference
- To help them create lasting bonds of friendship through acceptance and inclusive practices

The programme aims to ensure that students are well prepared to meet the challenges of the workplace and life beyond the campus and become responsible and proactive citizens who will contribute to society's progress.

Counselling

The Department of Psychology at Stella Maris College actively pursues activities to promote mental health awareness. To this end, it is home to an excellent Counselling Service and a critical support system for students and staff. The value of this service lies not only in receiving timely assistance but also enables students to see how mental health can be nurtured and regained after facing challenges in life. In addition, the Counselling services are supported by skilled counsellors who are well-versed in recognizing students' challenges. Going the extra mile, the Counselling Services offer psychological testing /assessments to provide further referrals to students to enable them to complete the crucial journey to optimize their mental well-being.

Ensuring all who need help are provided the same, the counselling services offer individual and group therapy. To this point, it was gratifying to have pro-bono telephonic sessions for students, their families, and the general public during the COVID-19 pandemic. Most importantly, it also runs support groups to benefit group therapy. An efficient Lead Counsellor with a proactive team heads the counselling endeavours on campus and runs training programs for faculty on mentoring and counselling. Whether a single counsellor or a team, the resources available at the Stella Maris College Counselling Services and its empathetic staff are always available with their selfless service and guidance.

Scholarships

Various Government scholarships are available for students belonging to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes (including those converted to Christianity), Most Backward Classes and De-notified Communities and Other Backward Classes. Free Education is also available to SC/ST students (including converts) and to first generation learners among Backward Classes. Such students

should apply to the College Office immediately after the reopening of the College for the relevant application forms.

Scholarships instituted by the Management and other sources, including those instituted in the Golden Jubilee Year, the Diamond Jubilee Year, the New Millennium and the Semi-sesquicentennial Year are also available.

Fee concessions are available for deserving students through their class teachers/mentors.

Stella Maris Pathway Programme

The Stella Maris Pathway Programme, with its goal 'Pathway to Opportunities', focusses on the overall development of students, through training in Life Skills, Computer Skills and Employability Skills, from Semesters I to VI.

Language Partnership Programme

The Language Partnership Programme (LPP) is a language support programme which aims at improving the English language proficiency of first year undergraduate students who need help in this area. Teaching is done by student-teachers who volunteer to teach. They are monitored by the faculty members in charge of the programme.

Remedial Coaching Programme

Remedial Coaching Programme (RCP) sessions are conducted on campus for both Shifts I and II either during the remedial hour or after regular class hours. RCP has been established to help the students improve their academic performance through peer teaching.

Campus Ministry

To foster the faith of Catholic students, the College offers activities such as Prayer Meetings and Bible Study. Student prayer groups

both in English and Tamil are given direction and guidance by members of the Campus Ministry.

Workshops on the art and science of relationship, well being and meditation, as well as guest lectures on course-related themes, are organised for the students.

Star of the Sea Group

The Star of the Sea Group (SSG) is an important organ of the Campus Ministry. It was founded in the academic year 2019-2020 in order to inculcate leadership qualities and foster faith formation in the Catholic students of the College. The key initiatives of SSG includes Leadership training programs, Outreach programs, Bible quizzes, Feast Day celebrations, SSG Talent Competition, Chirstmas programs and Youth conventions.

Stella Maris Sustainable Development Students' Hub

The college is an officially recognised member of Sustainable Development Solutions Network (SDSN) - a global initiative for the United Nations. The Stella Maris Sustainable Development Student Hub (SMSDSH) is a student-initiated programme aiming to amplify the tremendous energy and capabilities of today's youth in generating broader buy-in for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Three wings—Education, Solutions Lab and Community—have been established to carry out the operations of the Hub. The SMSD Students Hub facilitates the creation of student-inspired innovative solutions and connects local action with global advocacy.

In order to afford students, the opportunity to redress any grievance regarding Continuous Assessment and End Semester Examinations, the College has set up an Appeal and Grievance Redressal Committee with the Principal as the Chairperson.

Ragging Prevention Committee

In accordance with UGC norms, ragging in any form is strictly forbidden. Any student found guilty of ragging will face cancellation of admission/ suspension from the College/hostel, and a fine of Rs. 25,000 to Rs.1 lakh may be levied.

RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

The Hostels

There are five hostels for resident students: Our Lady's Hostel, Nava Nirmana, Mother Klemens Hostel, Snehalaya and Assisi Hostel. Apart from a friendly rivalry in games and sports, all the residents are united as one large, happy family. They elect their own representatives at the beginning of each term who then assume responsibility for the varied activities of hostel life which include gettogethers, entertainment and inter-hostel sports.

THE STUDENT

Every student is encouraged to make the most of every opportunity given to her to develop and grow into the best person she can possibly be. Stella Maris College expects each student to uphold the ideals and values of the institution, not only during her student days but also throughout her life. The spirit of Stella Maris is one of truth, compassion, service and devotion to God and one's country. It is for each Stella Marian to imbibe this spirit and demonstrate it in all her actions.

Truth and Charity is the hallmark of a true Stella Marian and should be reflected in her character, relationships and interactions, both within the College community and in society at large. A Stella Marian should be sensitive, courteous, caring and compassionate and uphold the virtues of honesty, respect for elders and kindness towards all. Every Stella Marian should apply herself to regular, systematic and focused study. Such sustained efforts will ensure that she achieves a high level of academic excellence and overall development.

Admission into the College mandates that students abide by the rules and regulations of the College. The decision of the Principal shall be final in all matters regarding rules and regulations and the enforcement of discipline.

ATTENDANCE

- Regular attendance in the classroom as well as the laboratory is expected of all students. Attendance is taken for every class, including Social Awareness Programmes, NCC/NSS/Games etc.
- Students must be present on the re-opening day of each semester. Those who fail to return on the specified day after the break will have to pay a fine.

MINIMUM ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENT

- A student will be permitted to take the End Semester Examination provided she has a minimum of 85 percent attendance per course.
- Students whose attendance falls between 75% and 85% due to participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities may be permitted to take the examinations on the recommendation of the respective faculty-in-charge/Head of Department.
- Students whose attendance falls between 75% and 85% due to participation in NCC/NSS/Sports may be permitted to take the examinations on the recommendation of the faculty-in-charge.
- Students whose attendance falls between 75% and 85% due to long-term illness/hospitalisation of ten days and above may be permitted to take the examination provided the Head of the Department has been notified on or before the third day of illness.
 A leave letter along with a medical certificate must be submitted

to the Head of the Department by the parent or guardian on or before the third day of leave.

• Students whose attendance falls below 50% in any course in a semester will have to re-register and repeat the course requirements after their final semester.

THE DECISION OF THE PRINCIPAL IS FINAL IN ALL MATTERS CONCERNING ATTENDANCE.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

Students, you are expected to maintain the highest standards of discipline and behaviour inside as well as outside the College campus by following the rules and regulations as laid down in the handbook.

- 1. It is your responsibility to preserve an environment conducive to learning.
- 2. You should respect and obey the rules and policies of the College.
- 3. Regular attendance at classes is mandatory.
- Attendance requirements for every course must be fulfilled.
 Attendance is taken at every lecture, practical or tutorial as specified in the College timetable.
- You can check your attendance on the College website through the student login. Any discrepancy may be reported to the course teacher and rectified within three days. No further corrections in attendance status will be permitted.
- 6. You are expected to write all the tests and submit assignments/seminars requirements for each course on time. Any malpractice during Tests/ Examinations will result in their cancellation. In the case of End Semester examinations, you will

- also be debarred from all the exams of the semester.
- 7. You must be present on the reopening day of each semester. Those who are absent on these days will have to pay the prescribed fine.
- 8. The day begins with a common prayer for which all should be present and in which all should participate with due reverence.
- You are not permitted to leave the College during working hours.In case of an emergency, permission to do so must be obtained from the Head of the Department.
- 10. You should wear identity card while on campus.
- 11. Students are expected to wear simple and modest dress. Students are permitted to wear a saree, or salwar kameez, or jeans and kurta, long kurtis and shirts. Sleeveless attire is not permitted. Long T-shirts are permitted only on Fridays.
- 12. You are not permitted to be in the parking lot during class hours.
- 13. You may not model/participate in live modelling shows/fashion shows/stage shows.
- 14. You may not participate in any of the following without prior permission from the Principal: give interviews, publish any material, or participate in radio/TV programmes.
- 15. Those of you who come by two-wheelers should obtain a vehicle pass on payment of a fee, and park in the allotted space. Vehicles without passes will not be allowed into the campus.
- 16. Undergraduate students are not permitted to park their fourwheelers on campus. They may be dropped off at college and picked up after classes if they have a vehicle pass.
- 17. Postgraduate students, MPhil and Doctoral scholars may park their self-driven cars in the area allocated for them on campus.

- Chauffeurs are not allowed to remain on campus.
- 18. Vehicle passes will not be necessary for those who come to college by cycle and electric bikes.
- 19. The helmet for two-wheeler riders is mandatory.
- 20. Littering is prohibited. You are expected to keep the classroom and campus neat and clean.
- 21. You should take care not to damage/deface College property (chairs, benches, tables, walls, etc.) A heavy fine will be levied on those of you who misuse/damage College property.
- 22. Eating in classrooms is not permitted.
- 23. You are expected to report to the Office of the Deans of Student Affairs whenever you change residence. Failure to report within three days will be regarded as a serious breach of discipline. In the case of those residing in the college hostel, permission to vacate the hostel must be obtained in advance from the Principal.
- 24. Tampering with/misuse of ID Cards or bus passes will result in withdrawal of these facilities
- 25. Smoking, consumption of alcohol, possession/use of drugs or drug peddling is strictly forbidden. Students found guilty of substance abuse or in possession of drugs will be suspended/dismissed from the College.
- 26. Protests/strikes on campus by students are banned. Students participating in them are liable to be suspended/dismissed from the College.
- 27. No student shall engage in any form of discrimination of another student/faculty.
- 28. The use of cell phones is banned in the classroom unless the teacher permits it for academic purposes.

29. Students are strictly prohibited from posting any derogatory content about the college, any faculty or any student on any social media site. If found guilty, strict disciplinary action will be taken including dismissal from the College.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES

Stella Maris College offers a wide range of programmes and course options to fulfill its vision and mission of imparting whole-person education in an inclusive environment. Rooted in the core values of the institution, the curriculum is designed to align with local, regional, national, and global developmental needs and a rapidly changing technological environment.

The College revises the curriculum every three years taking into consideration feedback from all stakeholders: students, alumnae, course teachers, industrial experts, members of the Academic Audit Committee and Boards of Studies. The revision made in the academic year 2019-20 integrates Outcome Based Education into the existing five-part curriculum in the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) format.

The College has introduced the Learning Outcome-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) model for all undergraduate and postgraduate programmes from the academic year 2023 – 2024. LOCF is a pedagogical model where the curriculum, pedagogy and assessment are planned to achieve predetermined and measurable outcomes. The focus of the model is on planning, mapping, and measuring of student outcomes.

All programmes of study are planned with Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs).

All POs, PSOs and COs are aligned with the Institution's Vision, Mission and Educational Objectives which are aligned in turn with national and global mandates for quality education: life-long learning, employability, entrepreneurship, and the ability to engage effectively with social realities.

Core and Major Elective courses contribute to the development of disciplinary knowledge. The Interdisciplinary and Elective Courses offered by other departments offer students an opportunity to explore points of intersection between different disciplines and enable students to function effectively in an increasingly multidisciplinary academic world. Foundation courses in English, Tamil, Hindi, Sanskrit, and French help undergraduate students in honing their communication and interpersonal skills while introducing them to cultural and literary aspects. Student development and training programmes and mandatory Service-Learning/Social Awareness courses create compassionate citizens who will be sensitive to social and environmental justice. The institutionalisation of Service Learning as a pedagogy creates avenues for students to strengthen classroom learning through interaction with communities and reflection on their experiences.

Independent learning and research are encouraged through Independent Electives and independent research projects. Certificate courses offered on online platforms such as SWAYAM offer opportunities for students to obtain extra credits.

Each year of study is divided into two semesters. The duration of a semester is 90 working days. The odd and even semesters are from June to November and November to April respectively.

Most courses have an End Semester Examination. Some courses prescribe submission of projects, portfolios, term papers, dissertations in lieu of an End Semester Examination.

STRUCTURE OF THE UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

The College follows the semester pattern requiring six semesters of study for a Bachelor's degree and eight semesters for B. V. A., and the CBCS for all academic programmes.

In the CBCS, each course offered in a semester is assigned a certain number of credits, depending on the quantum of work required of the student every week. A Credit is a unit of measurement for the quantum of work required of a student in a particular course. It reflects the number of instructional hours assigned to a course every week. e.g., 2 credits, 3 credits, 4 credits will have 2, 3, or 4 instructional hours per week respectively.

A student will earn the credits assigned to a course only when she successfully completes all the requirements of the course. A student will be awarded her degree on completion of the requirements of the curriculum: Parts I to V for B. A., B. V. A., B. Sc., B. Com., B. B. A., B. C. A., and B. S. W. programmes and Part I to IV for B. Voc. degree programmes.

A student must necessarily complete a minimum of 149 credits for a Bachelor's degree, 189 credits for the Bachelor's Degree in Visual Arts and 172 credits for Bachelor's Degree in Commerce (Honours) and 180 credits for Bachelor's Degree in vocational programmes.

Undergraduate programmes for B. A., B. V. A., B. Sc., B. Com., B. B. A., B. C. A., and B. S. W. degrees have the following components:

Part I Language & Part II English are mandatory courses for all students.

Part III comprises Major Core, Allied Core, Major Elective and Interdisciplinary Core Courses. Major Electives are offered by departments to students of their own department. Interdisciplinary Core courses are offered jointly by two departments. In addition to Core courses, a student is required to take courses under Part IV and Part V to obtain the minimum number of credits to graduate. Students who have not studied Tamil up to Std. X are required to take two courses in Basic Tamil of two credits each over two semesters in order to graduate. Students who have studied Tamil up to X/XII standard and have not taken Tamil in Part I are required to take two courses of two credits each in Advanced Tamil over two semesters in order to graduate.

ELECTIVE COURSES

Major Electives

Undergraduate students have the option of choosing between subject-related Major Elective (ME) courses – courses/project/subject-related skill development courses. Students must choose two such elective courses of five credits each and earn a total of ten credits.

Interdisciplinary Core Courses

The Credit requirement for the Interdisciplinary Core courses (IC) is five credits. Students are given the opportunity to explore the links between two different disciplines through a course designed and offered jointly by two departments.

General Elective Courses

The total credit requirement for General Elective (GE) courses is eight credits. The student can choose any four courses of two credits each across disciplines, but not from the parent department.

- A student cannot opt for more than two GEs from any one department.
- Students who have taken Tamil in Part I can take any four GE courses across disciplines.
- Students who have studied Tamil up to X/XII Std. and have not taken Tamil in Part I have to take two courses in Advanced Tamil over two semesters and two from other disciplines.
- Students who have not studied Tamil up to Std. X have to take two courses in Basic Tamil over two semesters and two from other disciplines.

Optional, Value-Added Courses

Undergraduate students can earn extra credits by taking up the following courses/programmes:

Independent Elective (UI)
Internships (UN)
Certificate Courses (CT)
Research Projects/Papers (RP)

Independent Elective Courses

A student may register for one UI course of three credits per semester. UI courses may be taken either from the parent department or from other departments. A three-hour End Semester Examination will be held for all Independent Elective courses. The marks and extra credits for those courses will be included in the marksheet. However, these marks will not be considered for the final classification

- A student who fails a UI course is not eligible for course completion for the same.
- A student who fails a UI course cannot re-register for the same course.
- Uls will not be offered in the first semester.

CREDITS EARNED UNDER PART V FOR B. A., B. V. A., B. Sc., B. Com., B. B. A., B. C. A., and B. S. W. AND PART III FOR B. Voc.

(a) STUDENT TRAINING PROGRAMMES (STP)

All students are required to enroll in any one of the programmes (NSS/YRC/RRC/NCC/Games) to earn a compulsory minimum of two credits and a maximum of five credits over three years.

- B. A., B. V. A., B. Sc., B. Com., B. B. A., B. C. A., and B. S. W. students opting for Games will earn two credits in one year (one credit per semester). B. Voc. students can only choose Games under STP and should earn one credit in one semester.
- Students opting for NCC will have to compulsorily continue in the third year. A minimum parade attendance of 60 hours in the first year and 70 hours in the second year and third year is required. They will earn one credit each in the first and second years and two credits in the third year.
- Students opting for NSS/YRC/RRC will have to be involved in activities during their first and second year for a minimum of 120 hours each year (240 hours at the end of the two years). They will earn a total of two credits (one credit at the end of each academic year).

National Service Scheme (NSS)

The objectives of the NSS are:

- · Creating social awareness to drive effective action.
- Active participation in the community's needs and problems

- to become agents of social change.
- Facilitating the overall development of students' personalities through involvement in community welfare projects.
- · Training students for responsible leadership roles.

Youth Red Cross (YRC)

STRUCTURE OF THE POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

As an autonomous College, Stella Maris follows the semester system requiring four semesters of study for a Master's Degree. A student must necessarily complete a minimum of 94 credits for an M. A. / M. Sc. / M. Com. Degree and 98 credits for an M. S. W. degree.

The total credit requirement for the postgraduate elective (PE) courses for each student is twenty-one credits. The student is

Independent Electives

A student may register for one independent Elective (PI) course of four credits per semester.

PI courses may be taken either from the parent department or from other departments. A three-hour End Semester Examination will be held for all Independent Elective Courses. The marks and extra credits for these courses will be included in the marksheet. However, these marks will not be considered for the final classification.

A student who fails a PI course is not eligible for course completion for the same.

A student who fails a PI course cannot re-register for the same course.

PI will not be offered in the first semester.

Registration for Elective Courses is online. Students are expected to register on the specified dates during the current semester for courses to be taken in the following semester.

Continuous Assessment (CA)

- Continuous Assessment will be carried out by the course teachers.
- Students are expected to take all testing units that are administered to them, i.e., two CA tests and additional components which may include seminar/assignment/project work/any other.
- The testing units carry equal weightage. Seminar/paper presentation is a requirement at the postgraduate level.
- There is no minimum mark required for passing in the Continuous Assessment.

Retests will be given only for those students who have missed the tests because of participation in College-sponsored activities such as NCC, NSS, Sports. These tests will be held before the commencement of the End Semester Examinations. Students must apply for the retest by filling in the prescribed forms available at the Vice-Principals' Office.

End Semester Examination

- A comprehensive examination is conducted in each course at the end of each semester
- A student will be permitted to take the End Semester Examination provided she has a minimum attendance of 85 percent in the course and has completed the Continuous Assessment requirements of test/assignments/seminars/project work etc.

Duration of Programme

- A student, who, for whatever reason is not able to complete the programme within the normal period (N) or the minimum duration prescribed for the programme, may be allowed two years' time beyond the normal period to clear any backlog to qualify for the degree. (Time span = N+2 years for the completion of the programme)
- In exceptional cases like major accidents or childbirth, an extension
 of one year beyond the maximum time span will be considered.
 (Time Span = N+2+1 years for the completion of the programme)

 During the extended period the student shall be considered a private candidate and will not be eligible for ranking.


