

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HEAR FROM AN ALUMNUS TURNED FACULTY

Now imagine this. It's the Valedictory Day, you are at the OAT, with your candles lit... cherishing all the lovely memories that these classrooms hold... finally bidding goodbye to the college... wondering if you'll ever return back. And VOILÀ, you find yourself back in those very classrooms but with the roles switched. That's exactly what happened with Ms. Tracy Jose, an Assistant Professor, from English Department Shift 1. Shakti Shree and Shaheen from the Solasta Writes team had the privilege of interviewing her and this is an excerpt from the interview.

Shakti: So the first thing I wanted to ask you was: becoming a professor, was it an accident or a choice? And, what is it like being a professor of English Literature?

Ms. Tracy Jose: I don't think I have always wanted to be a college teacher. I have been incredibly fortunate because I have had some wonderful lecturers at both the bachelors and masters levels. And I always hoped that I would also be able to get students excited about all the things that I have personally enjoyed learning about in literature. It's a lot of fun teaching the subject, because I get to read and find out about so many different things and also talk to so many people about it. I think that's the really great part about the job. Literature is also constantly changing and evolving. And while this is challenging, it's also very exciting, because you're never really teaching the same thing for too long. Classes also depend a great deal on how students respond to and interact with the texts we are dealing with. I find that I always learn something different each year with each new batch of students.

Shakti: You were an Assistant Editor at Oxford University Press. Could you tell us what exactly your job was, how you got in, and what was your biggest takeaway from it?

Ms. Tracy Jose: Right. So I actually joined OUP (Oxford University Press) shortly after I completed my master's degree at Stella. I actually just applied directly through their website, I cleared the written test and an interview with the publishing director and joined soon after. I joined as an editorial trainee, and became an assistant editor with the School Education team. It was a great learning experience, because I now know the different stages a book goes through, right from the manuscript to the different printed versions of a book. And while I learnt a lot there, I think my biggest takeaway, strangely enough, was that editing as a profession was just not my cup of tea.

I suppose sometimes you just have to spend some time with a job to come to the conclusion that it's not the right fit for you. I missed the classroom so much. I also missed reading for fun, and not just reading for editing. I think that was the main reason why I decided to quit my job with OUP, although I learnt a lot there. So shortly after that, I got my first teaching job at Mount Carmel College in Bangalore. And then one semester later, I joined Stella.

Shakti: What is your favourite thing about Stella? Is there a favourite spot, or a favourite ritual that you are particularly fond of?

Ms. Tracy Jose: I think my favorite part about the Stella campus is the Green Hut. I find that it's one of the most peaceful places on campus. When I was a student, my classmates and I used to go and spend a lot of time there. When we had extracurricular activities to do, the Green Hut was our go-to place. I have also taken a few of my classes there.

As far as the specific events go, at Stella, I think I love Valedictory day. I feel like that is such an emotionally packed day. The OAT also looks beautiful with all the candles.

MINING THE 'ORDINARY' IN THE EXTRAORDINARY: THE MIGHT OF ONE **PERCENT**

Imagine standing on a hill, overlooking stretches of what looks like a sunbathing session for Midas' personal belongings at the first glance: a sea of daffodils. Quite naturally, the scenario would evoke a slew of thoughts among which, 'how?' would dominate the mind. A humble board stuck on a tree says, "50,000 tulips. One woman to plant them all." Suddenly, the tenacity of the human will strike as more realistic than the seemingly impenetrable and mystifying halo it is made to be.

Popularized as the Daffodil Principle, this idea from Jaroldeen Edwards' book under the same name, successfully highlights the significance of a well-known yet often overlooked, widely aspired element: consistency. As creatures of habit, it is quite amusing to find ourselves rattled in the face of repetition with potential for higher returns. Our appetite for Netflix and the bittersweet relation with the Skip Ads button would possibly suggest contrasting evidence. The question however remains: What lies behind such contradictions?

The practice of working consistently on a skill often yields improvement in the learning curve; the end-result being beautiful and satisfying as opposed to the unappealing nitty-gritties of the actual process. Stripped of the pomp and show, consistency ultimately boils down to something very elementary: dedicated repetition. The power of a single act done religiously is immensely underrated and the difference between improving and regressing is best illustrated by the following example: Assume an action to be done as 1. If done every day for a complete year, the result would be unchanged i.e., 1 raised to the power 365 is 1. If is regressed by one percent and done consistently, the results do not look encouraging enough i.e., 0.99 raised to the power 365 is 0.03. If improved by the same amount and done consistently, the results differ widely i.e., 1.01 raised to the power 365 is 37.8.

The quality of being consistent often complements diligence and constitutes a significant part of a student's life. As Stella Marians, consistency is a key factor in most of our successful endeavors. Starting right from the plethora of club activities or the responsibilities that ensue to the rigorous curriculum and assignment deadlines, being consistent goes a long way in ensuring a seamless learning experience. At Stella Maris, we consistently strive towards becoming the best versions of ourselves. After all, who doesn't like the idea of avoiding a total meltdown right before the eleventh hour?

Rome wasn't built in a day! Set manageable expectations:

Setting small yet reasonable expectations everyday is a great way to start. The sense of satisfaction obtained from achieving the set goals for a day, feeds the motivation required to achieve the next goal.

Piece by piece! Strive for improvement, not perfection:

The process of consistency is all about focusing on getting better than what we were yesterday. Attaining mastery over your craft is a gradual process which relies heavily on improvement at every step of the way.

Make adjustments according to the progress made so far. In Dr. Marshall Goldsmith's words, "what got you here won't get you there."

BACK IN CIRCULATION

A look at what the Stella Maris College Library means to the student community.

When I recently stepped into the college campus after almost six months to interview librarian Dr. Mahalakshmi for this feature, I was immediately struck by the distinct atmosphere of learning that set it apart from the hustle and bustle of the city. Right from the gates where you are requested to show your ID cards, to the billboards commemorating the 75th anniversary of the college, the campus speaks for itself as an educational space with a longrunning legacy, intentionally created for communities to come together to share knowledge.

The push to get students back in campus even as COVID-19 continues reminds us of the role that the physical space, infrastructure, and other services of the college campus play in creating meaningful learning experiences.

Meeting new challenges:

The library had kept itself alive through the lockdown and assisted remote learning by making D-space (a digital repository of research papers, syllabi and question papers) accessible online. Having reopened after nearly six months, the library has now gone through a thorough eco-friendly pest control procedure and is back to offering extensive collections of resources and services to the community. It also looks forward to conducting events to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the college.

Catering to the Stella community:

Not all libraries are the same. Librarian Dr. Mahalakshmi who is an expert at Library Science highlighted how ours is unique from others around the city. The approach taken in arranging books, the kind of books in collection, the technology used to access it, and preservation methods give each library a distinct personality. A quick browsing of the different services of our library gives an idea of its objectives. While a local neighbourhood library might prioritize light reads, the Stella Library caters mainly to the Stella community and focuses on fulfilling their information needs, aiding the curriculum and extra research. It is also a space for Stella students, alumnae and faculty to exhibit their work and houses research papers and books written by them.

Opportunities offered:

The library is inclusive of the diversity of the Stella community and has computers with JAWS and NVDA software for visually challenged students and also employs students from economically weaker sections of the society for paid part time jobs and trains them in library maintenance under the Earn While You Learn scheme. Its state-of-the art Dropbox facility and Self-check improves ease of use and also introduces students to innovative methods of Library Science which is an up and coming field of study with promising careers according to Dr. Mahalakshmi who also spoke of rewarding internships at the US Consulate American library and British Council library.



It is also a space for Stella students, alumnae and faculty to exhibit their work and houses research papers and books written by them.

Deepening our experience:

The library is also a Stella Marian's go-to place for getting a better sense of the community they are part of. Stellarchives which is housed in the mezzanine floor documents the history of the institution from its founding in 1947 to the present day. Some of the interesting archives on display include:

Facets of evolving dress codes and life styles as seen in the students of the past and the present, their families and the society of the times, as well as geographical changes in the vicinity of the College.

Photographs of College buildings document the changes architectural styles and the growth of infrastructure on campus since the College was founded.

As physical learning resumes again, the library is at the heart of creating wholesome learning experiences and the Stella community once again, perhaps more than ever.

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

Bhavani is a III year student at Stella Maris College. She is currently pursuing her degree in Business Administrations. She is a talented dancer, choreographer with 10+ years of experience. She also likes organizing, arts and crafts.

Q: Can you tell us more about your small business Vrithi and how you started it?

A: First of all, thank you so much for opportunity. Vrithi established in August of 2020. Vrithi tamil means growth and sustainability which was suggested by my mother for my small business. At Vrithi, we originally handmade jewellery terracotta and beaded jewellery. We also focused on different beads that symbolise/emit various emotions for people to buy and wear. We focused on getting beads from all over India as one of my main motives was to depict Indian culture. This year we introduced fabrics - handbags, clutches, salwars, kurtis etc.

Q: I noticed that you started your business during the lockdown phase, what were the challenges you faced? How did you reach the level where your business started getting recognised by people that were not in your circle?

A: There are quite a few challenges that I faced. First, I was not a social media person - I joined instagram during the pandemic so navigating my way through it was a huge obstacle. Understanding a business page - its features, how it works etc was a challenge.

Second, the instagram algorithm. It was extremely hard to understand how it worked. I had to be very consistent. Third, establishing my brand name. People usually define a brand's legitimacy by the number of followers it has. Getting a good number of followers is a problem I still face. Instagram promotions is something I tried out which unfortunately didn't work for me.

Q: Do you have any inspiration that you look upto who has motivated you to start this business? I'm sure your mother plays a big part in this.

A: Yes of course. When I started this business, I was clueless as to where it was going. My friends and family (especially my mother) have been the ones who have supported me since the beginning. Seeing that I usually make a lot of things for myself (jewellery, greeting cards etc), they pushed me to start selling my creations during the lockdown considering that they found it beautiful and creative.

Q: Yeah, I think a lot of the small businesses go through this and haven't figured how to get out of it. So, do you sell only on Instagram or do you have other means?

A: I initially started out on Instagram but I do have a whatsapp group and a facebook page.

Q: Oh nice, what do you think you want to achieve in the next 5 years in terms of your small business?

A: I want to expand my business internationally. Sitting abroad, a lot of buyers are wary of buying from India considering that they might not reach on time and especially during a pandemic, in case anything happens, it is very hard for it to reach on time. They are being scammed into paying more for counterfeit/cheap products. I want to be able to solve this and branch out my brand.

Q: Wow! Lastly, what advice would you give to other entrepreneurs/small business owners?

A: First, I'd like to say that never invest too much in raw materials. Make small investments because when you're just starting getting orders is pretty hard. As you gain orders, start making bigger investments. Second, have a business plan. Research on the market and your target audience.

S: Thank you so much!I'm sure all other entrepreneurs will be enlightened by this. We wish you the best and hope you get more and more orders!

B: Thank you so much! .

Club President Gayathri Aravind talks about the club's compassionate and inclusive approaches to debating.

You've been a part of DEBSOC since you were a fresher. What does DEBSOC mean to you?

It has really changed me as a person. DEBSOC is a space that has helped me broaden my worldview and cultivate my interest in various topics. Interacting with diverse groups of people has given me a more wholesome, multi-dimensional understanding of issues and made me more compassionate. Dissecting debate motions (which is basically looking at a topic from different angles) with a group of people over a period of time makes it second nature.

I got to bond with a wider community of people: seniors, students from other departments, and people who I wouldn't have met or become friends with otherwise. In that regard, I'm grateful that DEBSOC at Stella Maris is very inclusive and there are no barriers to entry. In a lot of other places, you need to prove that you are a good debater/quizzer to get in, but here, anyone is welcome. This year, we are making the club even more inclusive by conducting events in Tamil and Hindi.

Debate models like MUNs seem to be all about proving one's arguing abilities and often the issues being debated become secondary. How does debating help build knowledge and compassion amidst this?

To be honest, I don't debate much in competitive models like MUNs. The competitive element is always going to be there within MUN and Debating circles, but, it is not everything. And it most definitely isn't what the Debate, Quiz and Current Affairs Club at Stella Maris is about. We want to start conversations and introduce new ideas to people. 


